***Education: Frozen in Time* by D. Caroline Coile, Ph.D.**

The use of frozen semen has continually increased since the American Kennel Club (AKC) recognized litters born from breedings using frozen semen in the 1980s.

Knowing a dog's life long health history adds information about the time before a hereditary problem became prevalent. "Using a deceased stud's semen allows breeders to reintroduce genes that may be lost through selection or random event, widening the breed's gene pool." states handler/breeder Dr. Caroline Coile (Dog World Magazine, July 09, p.23).

Although despite the scientific improvements in both freezing, thawing and insemination have improved, it is still costly. Not only are there collection, storage and insemination costs but also there are as many as 6 to 10 progesterone blood tests needed to pinpoint ovulation and surgically implanting needed for best success.

Critics express concern, as well, because, despite the costs and good reasons to go to this expense, breeding without checking for its impact, can introduce problems of its own. Breeders narrow the breed/s gene pool when one very famous or popular dog's semen is used in overabundance.

Special Interest: Keep them entertained as they age

"Veterinarians generally consider small dogs to be senior citizens at about 12 years of age," reports Pat Miller, dog behavior consultant and trainer, also noting that all dogs are living that long or longer. Like humans, if they exercise their brains, they stay more mentally alert. If they stay in good conditions and you communicate well with them using positive training methods, they will love learning. If you notice signs of cognitive disorder such as disorientation, increased sleeping, altered interactions or loss of housetraining, ask your vet about medications for cognitive disorder. In the meantime, there are activities such as Rally and "just for fun agility," where they do things at their own pace that your dog can enjoy (do an Internet search for more information).
