Focus on Education: Small but Might in Agility

Trisha Stall, owner and handler of various sizes of dogs and agility judge for DPE, USDAA and TDAA, primarily worked with dogs over 40 pounds before she started her dog training business. She then learned that she was captivated working with the athletic, energetic and feisty small dog known as a Toy. Medium to large dogs primarily take cues from your shoulders and arms; whereas, small dogs mainly cue from your feet, hip and, to a smaller extent, your shoulders. The direction feet point is more important to the smaller dog. The key is to keep moving.

Standing still slows dogs down, and over time, the dog becomes slower and slower on courses designed for both large and small dogs. The handler has more time to react on courses designed with large dogs in mind because the dog has more ground to cover between obstacles and their handler, more time to react. When a bit off in timing, the handler can make a correction in direction or call their dog away from an off-course choice.

Training tips for those interested in agility training for small dogs:

- 1) Don't bend over (slows)(interferes with physical clues)
- 2) Train on different seesaws and train to run to the very end (no surprises in varying bases and pivot points)
- 3) Implement gradual height increases of A-frame with plenty of distance on the approach.
- 4) Train distance from the start (two strides for a large dog; four or five for a small one)(Building a dog's confidence to work away from you gives you powerful handling options.)

Useful info.....

As a general rule of thumb, between 8 and 10 pieces of gum might be deadly to a 65 lb. Canine, but a smaller dog could easily die after ingesting far less (perhaps as few as two sticks of gum.)” Another Snopes quote from Pat Killain taken from the Official Publication of the Oklahoma City Obedience Training Club.

“Several recent scientific papers have reported that second hand smoke is a significant health threat for pets.
